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


Please arrive by 9:30 a.m. to start setting up your sewing station. Class will begin at 10:00 a.m. prompt!

Other needed supplies:

Sewing Machine in good working order

Hand sewing needle and thread for embellishments

Basic Sewing notions: sewing machine thread, scissors, pins, etc..

Small to medium cutting mat if you have one

Rotary cutter if you have one

**Extension Office will provide the fusible web.


IF ~ you need the pattern and/or rulers, class registration will be:

This is a machine applique class.

Skill level – All (beginners can do this!)

Participants need to bring:

- Sewing machine in good working order (machine needs to be able to do blanket stitch or zig-zag or any other decorative stitch of your choice).
- Applique sewing machine foot for your machine and a regular stitch foot.
- Basic sewing supplies: thread, scissors, pins, etc.

Fabrics and fusible web will be provided. All other supplies are provided. You are welcome to bring your own specialty fabric if you would like.

Please see options available. Select your option when you register. Some fabrics may vary depending on availability. Additional kits are available upon request. Please request additional kits at registration. Additional registration fee will apply.

Small Drawstring Bag

Needed: 2 coordinating fabrics ½ yd. each

1 ½ yd of ¼ inch ribbon

Thread

Scrap of quilting batting to cut 3 inch circle


Out of each piece of fabric cut a 13 ½ circle and a 10 ½ inch circle. You should have 2 large circles and 2 small circles. Choice one of the large circles to be the outside of the bag. On this circle one inch from the edge make 3/8 inch button holes on opposite side of the circle. See diagram below.

Cut a 3 inch circle out of the batting scrap.

Place the two large circles together with the right sides facing each other. Sew around the circle with a $\frac{1}{2}$ inch seam from the edge. Leaving a 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ - 2 inch opening for turning the circles.

Place the two small circles together with the right sides facing each other. Sew together with $\frac{1}{2}$ inch seam from the edge with the right sides facing each other. Leaving a 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ - 2 inch opening for turning the circles.

After the large circle is turned top stitch around the circle just above and below the buttonholes. See diagram below.




Turn both circles and stitch up the turning opening. Press both circles being sure the sides are smooth and the seams are flat.

Place the large circle down and place the 3 inch batting circle in the center. Place the smaller circle in the center of the large circle covering the batting circle. When all circles are centered pin in place.

Using a decorative stitch of your choice stitch around the outside of the batting circle through all fabric. Look at your project as a pie shape and cut the pie into sections similar to a pie; stitch from the seam around the batting to the edge of the smaller circle using the same decorative stitch. Cut your ribbon into 18 inch pieces and run through the buttonholes. One strand should run from one button hole and the other strand from the other button hole. Use the ribbons as a draw string. Knot the ends together at each button hole. Draw the bag up into a cute little bag.





A Stitch in Time: History of Vintage Quilts

Patchwork quilts began with the first settlers out of necessity to reuse and repurpose materials.

These quilts were pieced together to form designs or just as a scrappy quilt. The pieces needed to be precisely cut and sewn together.

Bed covers had to be made in quantity. Drafty houses, or dugout houses carved into sod required many quilts to provide warmth during the bitter cold winters.

Money was scarce, and cloth was expensive. So, what seemed like worthless scraps of cloth from worn clothes or salvaged from clothes making, were pieced together to useable pieces of fabric that became one side of the quilt.

These quilters developed several patterns that became part of folk tradition. These patterns have names that reflect elements of everyday life, such as Log Cabin, Flying Geese, Drunkards' Path, Lone Star, Bear's Paw, Broken Dishes, and Windmill to name a few.
